

## COPYRIGHT

In response to pressure from the academic community, many journal publishers now support some form of open access.

Even where copyright in a journal article has been assigned, the publisher will often allow authors to reserve the right to disseminate a copy of the article via their institutional repository, provided it is the author's own version that is used (i.e. the final corrected manuscript – not the publisher's copy-edited version).

The depositing author (or nominee) may be unsure about which, if any, rights have been reserved. Consequently, the repository staff will check the publisher's policy and enable an appropriate level of access to the fulltext.

Authors should advise repository staff if they have negotiated special terms with the publisher.

**Note:** QUT's non-exclusive licence to use scholarly works created by QUT authors is upstream from any publication agreement. It gives QUT authors more power when negotiating the terms of a publication agreement.

## QUT ePRINTS

- Stores, displays, indexes scholarly materials in digital form
- Promotes the work of QUT staff, postgraduate students and affiliates to a global audience
- Supports and facilitates QUT's eResearch initiatives

QUT ePrints is an 'open access' online collection of scholarly publications by QUT authors.

Each record in QUT ePrints includes the full publication details for the work plus a hypertext link to the journal or the publisher's website. In most cases, an 'open access' copy of the author's final manuscript version of the work can be downloaded.

The collection is indexed by Google; Google Scholar and other web search services such as the National Library of Australia's ARROW Discovery Service

**QUT ePrints includes:** journal articles, conference contributions (papers, presentations and posters), reports, theses, books, book chapters, working paper series and other research outputs in digital form.

## BENEFITS FOR AUTHORS

### Greater research impact

- Increases the profile of QUT research articles.
- Extends access beyond the subscriber base of the journal which means that the work is more likely to be read and cited by others.
- Facilitates practitioner-access to the latest research (e.g. nurses, teachers, optometrists, psychologists etc).
- Contributes to the growing corpus of high quality research literature that is freely available online.

### Convenience

- Materials deposited in QUT ePrints are given URLs that can be included in reference lists and CVs or given to colleagues who request a copy of a paper.
- Authors are given a URL that will display all their deposited works. This URL can be included in the author's email signature.

### Long term storage location

- Ensures continuity of access for conference papers. The copy in QUT ePrints will be accessible even if the conference website disappears.
- QUT ePrints provides a convenient online location for the storage of academic papers. Open access papers are accessible from anywhere in the world, even after the author moves to another institution.

### Monitor interest

- Download counts are available for all documents.

## SUPPORT FOR OPEN ACCESS

Many research funding bodies now require grant recipients to provide open access copies of articles reporting the results of research they have funded.

This includes NIH, Max Planck, Research Councils in the UK and many others. From 2008 onwards, Australian Research Council (ARC) grant recipients who do not provide open access copies of their articles must submit an explanation.

## QUT POLICIES ON OPEN ACCESS

### QUT Eprint Repository Policy

In 2003, the QUT University Academic Board endorsed a University-wide Eprint Repository Policy. The policy can be accessed at [www.mopp.qut.edu.au/F/F\\_01\\_03.jsp](http://www.mopp.qut.edu.au/F/F_01_03.jsp)

Note: Research output intended for commercialisation of any kind is excluded from the policy.

### QUT Intellectual Property Policy

Scholarly works published by QUT staff are subject to a non-exclusive licence in favour of QUT.
